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HIV Prevention Trials Network (HPTN):

HPTN 096 at Code Red Gala

The <u>HPTN 096</u> (BETA) study team recently attended the Rapha Center Code Red Gala in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. The event recognized individuals who have contributed to building and leading community-led initiatives to end the HIV epidemic in South Florida. The Gala was sponsored in part by HPTN 096, a study testing an integrated strategy designed to improve access to and uptake of HIV prevention and treatment services for Black men who have sex with men (MSM) in the southern U.S.

The <u>HPTN 096</u> Peer Support component leaders met with stakeholders from <u>Montgomery Pride United</u>, <u>Normal</u> <u>Anomaly</u>, and the <u>Center for Health Empowerment</u> to begin laying the groundwork for a collaborative implementation approach for the program in Montgomery and Dallas. The <u>HPTN 096 Peer Support Program</u> offers individual support to Black gay, bisexual, same-gender-loving, and other men who have sex with men in select communities as part of the study's integrated strategy.



HIV Vaccine Trials Network (HVTN):

HVTN 807-Antiretroviral Analytical Treatment Interruption (ATI) in people living with HIV (PLWH)

In August of 2023, HVTN launched an ATI research study. An ATI is the temporary stopping of using HIV medicine in a structured research study that is carefully monitored. It can be used to assess the effects of interventions like vaccines to understand more, for example, about how long the virus takes to rebound, the size of the viral reservoir that an individual has, and to understand specific immune responses to HIV that could inform the development of HIV prevention and treatment interventions. An ATI is an experimental procedure that is only used in carefully monitored research and is not part of recommended healthcare for PLWH. The study will enroll 40 participants. The study participants will be divided into two groups. Participants in Group 1 will get 2 doses of the study vaccine and then will undergo an ATI (stop taking their HIV medicine), and their HIV and health will be carefully tracked to ensure their safety and wellbeing. Participants in Group 2 will also get 2 doses of the study vaccine, but they will not undergo an ATI. Volunteers will be able to choose which group they want to join because the visit schedules are quite different. The study is being conducted in the US at 8 clinical centers: Birmingham, AL, Boston, MA, Atlanta, GA, Decatur, GA, New York, NY, Philadelphia, PA, Pittsburgh, PA, and Seattle, WA.

HVTN 605/A5421 – The Network's First Tuberculosis Vaccine Study

The HVTN opened HVTN 605/A5421, the network's first tuberculosis vaccine study, on January 12, 2024. This study is a collaboration with the Advancing Clinical Therapeutics Globally for HIV/AIDS and Other Infections (ACTG) to test the safety and immunologic response to an experimental TB vaccine called MTBVAC and compare it with the currently approved vaccine BCG both in people living with and without HIV. HVTN 605/A5421 will enroll about 276 participants at 16 sites in South Africa, aged 12 through 55 who have had a BCG vaccine during infancy.

As of February 13, the study has enrolled 12 participants, 3 living with HIV and 9 living without HIV. Enrollment is expected to be complete in May 2024. The results of HVTN 605/A5421 will help understanding of how the immune system responds to these vaccines and whether these vaccines are as safe in people living with HIV (PLWH) as they have been in people without HIV. In addition, the data from this study will directly inform how PLWH can be included in future efficacy trials.
